

FIANANCE A Message from John Trowbridge, Finance Committee Chair

Hello Hillcrest UMC! I want to inform everyone about the financial state of HUMC, so that all can understand what we are able to do financially to build up the church as well as how we can continue to support missions throughout our amazing community. I cannot tell everyone how much it warms my heart to see how generous the congregation is with their giving, and we continue to be strongly rooted in our financial status. We are beginning to plan for 2022, and with the continue support of everyone, we will be able to continue supporting our community the way that Hillcrest has done for decades.

Below is a status of where we are currently, as of Aug 2, 2021:

- Current Income as of Aug 2, 2021 = \$126,105.36
- Current Expenses as of Aug 2, 2021 = \$111,645.06
- Net (Expenses vs Income) = \$14,460.30 under budget
 - o 11.46% surplus of Income needed to be on budget
- Total 2021 Budgeted Expenses = \$218,452.00
- Total 2021 Income vs Needed to meet Budgeted Expenses =
 - o Need \$4,201 weekly or \$126,030 as of Aug 2, 2021
 - o Currently we are \$9,081.85 short of our budgeted goal as of Aug 2, 2021
 - ☐ Equates to 8.13% shortage for budgeted expenses for 2021 thus far

As we discuss this information, we are healthy and able to do what we need to do, improve our Church in ways that have been needed, and start getting back to normal and worshiping in the ways that we have all done throughout our lives. To try and make everyone's giving just a little easier, I have been able to create a QR code for online giving.

"So what is a QR Code John?"

I am so glad that you asked. A QR code is a "quick response" code. This is a unique identifier that someone or an organization can use to allow anyone to bring information up on their personal device. You may have seen these at restaurants lately for paperless menus, or you may have seen them as informational information for a specific company. For Hillcrest, I jumped on the train, trying to make it even easier for the congregation to give their gifts. All you have to do is;

- 1) Open the camera on your phone, tablet, electronic device
- 2) Point your camera at the QR code that is in this article, on the announcement slide before service, or the bulletin each Sunday
- 3) Your device will automatically prompt you to open your internet browser
- 4) Voila, you are automatically sent to the VANCO page for Hillcrest UMC!!!



If you have any questions, please let me know. As always, I would like to ask that all of our Hillcrest family take a look at your 2021 spending and what you initially pledged to the church this year. Are you able to meet it still? Are you in a good financial place in your lives where you can give more? These are only questions that you can answer, however, to ensure that the church is able to do all of the great things that have been done before, and grow within our community, we have to ensure our financial security is intact as well.

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Why You Need to Try to Understand Other People's Perspectives by Wes | Sep 21, 2016 | Christian Living

If someone's behavior or opinion seems completely absurd to you, you could tell them they are wrong or even idiotic. You could tell them they should stop thinking that way and see things your way. Or, on the other hand, you could start by trying to understand their perspective. You could ask them friendly questions about their point of view. Actually, this is not only good advice, it is an imperative for Christian living. Here is why you need to try to understand other people's perspectives.

1. You might be wrong and they might be right.

In Acts 17, Luke contrasted two groups of people, the Jews in Berea and the Jews in Thessalonica. I'm certain both groups of Jews were diligent students of Scripture, but what made the Jews in Berea "more noble" than those in Thessalonica was their willingness to listen to another perspective about Scripture. The apostle Paul came to each city and preached a brand new idea. One group disagreed and refused to even listen to Paul's differing perspective. But the Bereans listened eagerly, comparing what Paul said to Scripture "to see if these things were so" (Acts 17:11).

We ALL assume we are right about what we think. When we hear something that differs with our opinion, we say, "I disagree!" But we need to learn to say, "Tell me more; I want to understand where you're coming from," because it may turn out they are right and we are wrong.

If we are going to be people who learn and grow, we must stop looking to win arguments and start looking to discover truth.

2. You need to love your neighbor as yourself.

Loving your neighbor as yourself means "whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them" (Matthew 7:12).

- Don't you want others to take time to hear you out?
- Don't you want others to try to understand where you're coming from?
- Do you appreciate when people write you off before they understand what you're saying?

Let's treat our neighbor the way we want to be treated. Let's try to understand where they are coming from; if for no other reason than that's what we wish others would do for us.

This doesn't mean you have to accept their position as being correct. It doesn't even mean you can't try to change their mind. But it does mean you recognize it is NOT loving to try to persuade someone before you even understand them. Strive to understand before you strive to be understood.

3. You need to know what is (and isn't) honorable in their sight.

In Romans 12, the apostle Paul was explaining what it looks like to live in step with the gospel. He was explaining how Christians are to treat one another, their neighbors, and even their enemies. In verse 17 he says, "give thought to do what is honorable in the sight of all." That is a command that would totally transform our lives, if we would let it.

The phrase, "give thought" means to "consider in advance." It is forethought. Paul says we need to consider in advance "to do what is honorable in the sight of all." In other words, give forethought to how our actions will be perceived by other people. How in the world can we give forethought to that unless we first understand our neighbors' point of view?

In order to be a person of truly Christian conduct, you MUST find out how other people think. You must try to see things through their eyes. You must try to see yourself, your words, and your behavior through their eyes. This is the only way you can "live peaceably with all" (vs. 18).

Conclusion

It might be a cultural issue like "Black Lives Matter." It might be a political issue like which party or candidate to support. It might be a religious issue like how to worship. The question is, do you *really* understand the other perspective? Have you sat down with people who hold that point of view? Have you just listened? Have you said, "Would you explain this to me? I really want to understand."

I see Christians doing this all the time, trying to understand other perspectives. They seek to understand before they seek to be understood. But I also see a lot of people arguing without really understanding the other perspective. Unfortunately, I've participated in that and I'm sorry. I want to do better. How about you? I love you and God loves you,

Methodist Now: The United Methodist Church ~ The faith of a sports icon

With baseball season in full swing, enjoy this story about the legendary Jackie Robinson and his grounding Methodist faith.

Baseball icon Jackie Robinson's Methodist faith

Besieged by death threats, racial abuse and physical danger, somehow Jackie Robinson never publicly lost his composure during the 1947 Major League Baseball season, when he integrated the league.

It was an amazing achievement, given Robinson's reputation in the Negro baseball league as having a "temper like a rattlesnake," said Michael G. Long, co-author with Chris Lamb of "Jackie Robinson: A Spiritual Biography."

Robinson had a little-known ally helping him stay stoic and perform well through the ordeal. He had faith.

After a tense day at the ballpark, Robinson would head to his bedroom, get on his knees and pray for strength and courage, his wife Rachel Robinson told Long.

"His faith acted as a source of comfort, but also a challenge," Long said. "(He was) comforted when he felt tension. It also challenged him to ... not fight back."

'God's a Methodist'

Robinson grew up attending Scott Methodist Church in Pasadena, California. But his Methodism and relationship with the Rev. Karl Everette Downs have been downplayed or ignored in many stories and biographies.

There's one scene in "42," the film about Robinson starring Chadwick Boseman, that mentions the connection.

But it's a good one.

Branch Rickey, the Brooklyn Dodgers executive responsible for recruiting Robinson to break the color barrier, is played by Harrison Ford. In one scene, he declares: "Robinson's a Methodist. I'm a Methodist. God's a Methodist. We can't go wrong."

There's no confirmation that Rickey actually said that, but it's clear that their shared Methodist heritage was a factor in Robinson's selection.

Grace under pressure

Robinson had a .311 lifetime average, won rookie of the year and most valuable player and helped the Dodgers to a World Series victory in 1955. He's in the Baseball Hall of Fame and his number 42 was retired by MLB in 1997.

"What's most remarkable to me is that Robinson put those stats up while he was under death threats," Long said.

Robinson played much of his career under death threats, as well as experiencing abuse from racist fans and other players. Even some of his Dodgers teammates signed a petition to Rickey in 1947 protesting the hiring of a Black player.

Philadelphia Phillies manager Ben Chapman famously hurled the N-word and other racist epithets at Robinson, and encouraged his players to do so, during a game in Brooklyn on April 22, 1947.

"Those (incidents were) really psychologically damaging," Long said. "I don't want to downplay that. But going out onto the field thinking that somebody in the stands might shoot you is on a different level."

But Robinson held his desire to retaliate in check in the interests of the greater good. If he had failed, many Black baseball players wouldn't have gotten a shot in the big leagues.

Robinson's Methodist roots

Robinson attended Scott Methodist Church as a boy at the insistence of his mother, Mallie Robinson. The arrival of Downs in 1938 to the church was a game-changer for Robinson, who was already a local sports hero as a youth.

"What he did was to inject some of the Black social gospel into Scott Methodist Church," Long said. "And he began to envision the church as having an important role in the community, and Robinson was really attracted to that."

Mallie Robinson had already instilled racial pride in her son. She had an interpretation of the Adam and Eve story that Jackie took to heart.

"Mallie taught Jackie that Adam and Eve were originally Black," Long recounted. "And then they were scared white when God caught them eating of the tree of knowledge of good and evil."

The moral of the lesson was that Jackie's black skin was a gift from God in which to take pride. His mother also taught him that it was God's will to fight for freedom in the present, rather than await a better world in the afterlife.

Robinson continued that fight after his baseball career, as an associate of the Rev. Martin Luther King during the civil rights struggles of the 1960s.

Robinson died in 1972, of complications from heart disease and diabetes, at 53. He was nearly blind from the latter disease.

A paper released in April by three California researchers speculates that the real cause of Robinson's death was racism.

"When a person repeatedly experiences the stress of racism, high levels of the stress hormone cortisol are released in the body," wrote researchers Tamra Burns Loeb, Alicia Morehead-Gee and Derek Novacek in a story released by the University of California. "Elevated cortisol can lead to high levels of blood sugar, as seen in diabetes and high blood pressure."
