
However, the greatest thing we can do to make them feel that they are still a part of the church is for us to call them, write to them, and to visit them. This is



A Message from John Trowbridge, Finance Committee Chair

Hello Hillcrest! After a 2-quarter hiatus of Financial Articles, I am back. We have had a busy Financial Year for the Church so far, and the year is only half over. The large expense that we have had in 2022 was the amazing renovation of our Parsonage. Hopefully you were able to swing by during the open house day and take a tour, it really came out spectacular. The total Church cost was \$85,000, which approximately 65% of

that cost was taken from the Parsonage Fund, where monthly rental checks were being deposited from the previous tenants. I believe that it is important as a Church that everyone know and understand where their gifts each week are going.

With that last statement in mind, I encourage everyone to take a minute and look at the monthly budget updates that are posted on the cork board outside of the Church office. If you have any questions, please reach out and ask.

We are in full swing of building the 2023 Calendar Year Budget. If you are in charge of a Mission Area of the Church, and have financial support from a budgetary line item, I will be reaching out to you in the coming weeks asking for inputs into the next budget. It is important to take a hard look at past, current, and future spending so that we can accurately build a realistic budget that is attainable and keep HUMC in a healthy financial position. Speaking of healthy financial position, we continue to remain safe and stable. Our monthly spending is right on track with our budgeted allowances. As we continue returning closer and closer to pre-COVID activities at the Church, being able to support every Mission Area adequately is important and essential.

Red Cross Declares Blood Shortage

The American Red Cross is facing a national blood crisis – its worst blood shortage in over a decade, posing a concerning risk to patient care. Amid this crisis, doctors have been forced to make difficult decisions about who receives blood transfusions and who will need to wait until more products become available. Blood and platelet donations are critically needed to help prevent further delays in vital medical treatments.

"While some types of medical care can wait, others can't," said Dr. Pampee Young, chief medical officer of the Red Cross. "Hospitals are still seeing accident victims, cancer patients, those with blood disorders like sickle cell disease, and individuals who are seriously ill who all need blood transfusions to live even as Omicron cases surge across the country. We're doing everything we can to increase blood donations to ensure every patient can receive medical treatments without delay, but we cannot do it without more donors. We need the help of the American people."

Boundaries of New Districts Outlined

Following the vote of the Annual Conference on Friday, June 17, 2022, that set the number of districts to eight effective July 1, 2022, in keeping with Paragraph 415.4 of the 2016 UMC Book of Discipline, and in consultation with the Cabinet, the boundaries of the new districts shall be as follows, effective July 1, 2022:

The exterior boundaries shall be the combined boundaries of their former constituent districts in their bi-district configurations (which were established July 1, 2021), with the dissolution of the interior boundary of the former paired districts, to form eight new districts as shown below both in table and map.

These districts shall be served by the eight district superintendents as listed below.

Each of the eight new districts has begun its implementations; which, by agreement, will be completed in all districts by January 1, 2023. As with the District Initiative work to date, the implementation in each district is proceeding within the context of each district.

There will be Called District Conferences this summer in each district to set the organizing in motion. Design is continuing in each district focused not only on structure but especially on the missional Kingdom work of each district. The District Initiative has never been a "one fits all" but is contextual for each district. Each district has the agency to organize itself for the ministry God is calling them to, supporting churches and community through the work of the laity and clergy in partnership. The Rev. Denise Bates, dean of the Cabinet said, "We need the participation and passion that God's people bring to this work. We want to continually and creatively be responsive to the needs of communities, churches, laity, and clergy, so we can share the Love of Christ in real and tangible ways, even in the midst of challenges."

History of the Holston Conference

The Holston Conference is the organization of nearly one thousand United Methodist churches in thirty-three East Tennessee counties, seventeen southwest Virginia counties, a county and portions of two others in northwest Georgia, and one church each in Alabama and West Virginia. There are nearly one thousand pastors, chaplains, and other clergy, and nearly 175,000 lay members. The conference took its name from the three forks of the Holston River, which rises in southwest Virginia and flows into the Tennessee River. The first official Methodist pastor, Jeremiah Lambert, came to the Holston country in 1783. Initially one "circuit" covered nearly half the present territory. The conference organized in 1824, with Robert Richford Roberts as its first bishop. Until the 1880s Holston Conference encompassed several counties in western North Carolina and two or more West Virginia counties until 1939. Almost all the land in the Cherokee Nation once fell within the Holston Conference, including parts of South Carolina, North Carolina, and Georgia, as well as southeast Tennessee.

From 1865 to 1939 two Holston Conferences covered essentially the same territory—Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church (ME, sometimes called the "Northern" Church) and Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (MES, sometimes called the "Southern" Church). The Methodist denomination split in 1844, partly over the issue of slavery. There were no "northern" churches within Holston between 1844 and 1865, but some members left the "southern" church, and many congregations were unsettled. During the Civil War, some congregations lost their buildings as a result of military occupation. From 1830 until 1939 the Virginia District of the Methodist Protestant Church covered some of the same territory as the ME and MES Holston Conferences. In 1939 the three came together in the Methodist Church. In 1968, when the Methodist Church merged with the Evangelical United Brethren Church (EUB), what had been in some years the East Tennessee Conference of the United Brethren Church (UB), comprising much of the same geographical area, became part of the Holston Conference of the United Methodist Church (UMC).

Through approximately 175 years, the bodies that today make up the Holston Conference have placed a great deal of emphasis on education and social service, as well as on preaching, worship, and salvation. Today, the conference owns two senior colleges and a junior college; at various times there were at least four other colleges and several high schools and elementary schools.

The conference also operates a hospital, a children's home (started by Methodist women) with several branches, six retirement homes, and six camps. Many local congregations operate daycare centers and a wide variety of community services; many provide meeting places for secular and ecumenical endeavors. Some are biracial, and a few are bilingual. In 1824 there were three districts with twenty-four circuits. To-day, there are eleven districts. Twenty percent of the churches are still on circuits in which a pastor serves more than one church. Many of these pastors are bi-vocational.

An uncounted number of missionaries, both lay and clergy, have gone from the Holston Conference to other parts of the United States and around the world in the name of Christ. In addition, the churches and the conference together support many other religious, medical, and social ministries and missions.
